## WORLD WAR I FEATURED ONE OF HISTORY'S LAST GREAT NAVAL BATTLES.

There were more than **250 SHIPS** involved in the **BATTLE OF JUTLAND**.

Germany lost just 178 OF THE 400 U-BOATS it built—but still managed to SINK 5,554 ALLIED AND NEUTRAL SHIPS.

The U-boats' most famous victim was **RMS LUSITANIA.** It was torpedoed in 1915 and sank in just 15 minutes. **1,198 PEOPLE ABOARD DIED**, including **128 AMERICANS**.

21.2 MILLION WERE 8 million soldiers died-or There were 6.6 MILLION CIVILIAN DEATHS, including 6,000 DEATHS EVERY WOUNDED. DAY OF THE WAR. 2 million in Russia alone IN ALL, 65 MILLION MEN fought in World War I-from 40 COUNTRIES and dozens of colonies.
